

Bellringers Virtual Outing and Ringers Tea

Saturday 13th March 2021

Who said you couldn't have a Ringers Outing during Lockdown? With Ringing Room and Zoom anything is possible and so quick to travel between the towers.

Over the last year our band has met on several occasions either socially distanced or on Zoom but we hadn't had a whole afternoon together. Encouraged by two of the things to do for *Tail Ends* in *50 Virtual Ringing* things I decided to plan an outing.



It started off quite simply to ring at two or three towers and have tea in the middle and drinks at the end as you would for a real outing, but it sort of snowballed. I was worried that people might get bored of sitting by the computer all afternoon, so we decided on two towers and those chosen were the towers of two ringers who support our online band here in Lytchett Matravers. Our first tower was at Broadfield Park in Somerset with Mick Howes followed by Hogwarts Castle in Scotland with Jack Pease. It started to come together when we received a delightful O.W.L letter from Professor McGonagall accepting our request to ring at Hogwarts.

Towers sorted, now to think about tea. In our last Guild Face to Face magazine there were 4 cake recipes from members of the Guild to try, getting us ready for returning to ringing. Between our ringers, we made 2 Pat's perfect Parkins, 5 Gran's Victoria Sponges, 3 Chewy Cakes and 3 Dark Side cakes with a few variations on some of the recipes. These were then delivered around the village or to neighbours if outside the village, so everyone had a taste. More plans were then prepared to entertain during the afternoon.

On the day, we were delighted that all our band, less one who was sadly unwell, were able to join in so that was 14 of us, and also Steph from the 'other' Lytchett. We were supported by our trusty helpers Jack, Mick and Jane Pridmore and were delighted to welcome Stephen our vicar, Robert Wellen, our Guild Master, and Vicki Rowse who kindly lent us her Zoom account so we didn't have to keep going in and out of Zoom every 40 minutes.

Our first tower was all the way over in Somerset at their heavy 12 bell tower and organised by Mick where we rang lots of things from Call Changes to Grandsire and the finale was to ring rounds on their heavy 16. We were delighted that Mick's wife Karen came to join us for Rounds. I'm not sure if Mick got any supper that night as he put her on the heaviest bell – she must have been exhausted. We then broke up into groups for tea at 'The Rope Retreat', 'Sally's Social Space' or 'The Stay at Home Café'. Robert was able to join us at 'The Stay at Home Café' and had the opportunity to chat to some of our ringers. One of the reasons we split into 3 rooms was that we have gained 3 new ringers during lockdown and it gave them the opportunity to chat to our ringers in smaller groups as there is not so much opportunity to chat in Ringing Room on practice nights.

Our *Head Baker*, Ann Manning had organised us to making cakes. Our reviews of the cakes were:

Victoria Sponge: Well risen, light, nice soft texture, filling and tasty. Easy recipe, ideal for first timer.

Chewy Cake: Cross between a flapjack and tray bake. Super simple to make. Slightly on the sweet side.

Parkin: Easy to make as everything goes in one bowl. Great with butter spread on the top. Very substantial.

Chocolate Cake: Super scrumptious with just the right amount of sweetness. Easy to make. Variations on the icing were a lighter fudge icing or a ganache.

The previous week our **Travel Agent**, Helen, had sent us a special O.W.L delivery ticket including a password letter to enable us to catch the train from Platform 9¾ up to Hogwarts. Though a little late we were allowed in to ring and thanks to Professor McGonagall (AKA Jack Pease) for running that ringing session. We had to type our password into the Chat in Ringing Room before we were allowed to ring (This was to encourage people to use the chat which it transpired some didn't know existed) The letters were all magicked together to form an anagram of two words – one a bellringing word and another a 'Harry Potter' word. Thank goodness Sarah got the first word GRYFFINDOR so she received the first key to unlock the door to get us out of the tower and Sue got the second word GUDGEON to get the second key as the door was double locked. (Special congratulations to Sue who is one of our new recruits and only once rang a bell at an Open Day over a year ago - she had clearly done her homework the previous week when they did some work on naming the parts of a bell) When we left, the keys remained in the door, but Sarah and Sue received the keyrings which were made from the old Headstocks following our Bell Restoration in 2019. At Hogwarts, we rang things like Rounds to Reverse Rounds, Plain Bob Doubles and Rounds on 14. The speciality for Hogwarts, which some of us had learnt, was Transfiguration Place Doubles which we rang twice. We had been advised that the conductor at Hogwarts would be making his calls in parseltongue when we were ringing **Transfiguration Place Doubles**. Go and Stop were Lumos and Nox, Wand-lighting and wand-extinguishing charms respectively.

Following ringing at Hogwarts Castle, **Professor McGonagall** consulted with the '**sorting hat'** to decide which Hogwarts house we would be joining for our second refreshment break. These were one of Hufflepuff, Slytherin or Gryffindor. Ravenclaw was being used by the Hogwarts senior students for their N.E.W.T exams so we had to move quietly to our selected Tea Room. We were also joined here by our vicar Stephen who had magicked himself into the main hall at Hogwarts while we were ringing. Luckily Viv and John had joined us here and were able to put a spell on us to be whisked off to the houses where we had the opportunity to talk to a different group of ringers and friends and drink more tea or Hobgoblin beer.

I think we all thought 3 hours in front of the computer would get VERY dull and I was concerned people would drift away during the second tea break, but we all re-joined the main room for a final chat and farewell and were surprised how quickly the afternoon had passed. I was even asked when the next Outing would be!

On this day, The Church of England partnered with *Marie Curie* to make it A National Day of Reflection to remember all those who sadly lost their lives to COVID-19.



This was followed by a one minute silence from 12.00 noon. Cathy Neyland then tolled the tenor bell for 13 minutes to represent the 13 months since the first UK death from Coronavirus.

3 in 1 Bells today to celebrate Easter at St. Mary's, Lytchett Matravers. We had a Live service in the church which was also sent out on a live feed through U-Tube. Not knowing what we would be able to ring on Easter Day, our Virtual Handbell group made a recording of 'Jesus Christ is Risen Today'. Because there were only three of us we had several bells each but, as we now know, this is quite possible in Ringing Room. Our vicar used this recording at the beginning of the service while the notices

How to Re-establish Ringing in a Village Band

Sunday, 9th May

Debbie was asked to give a presentation by the joint CCCBR and ART. It was quite a task and even though I thought I could base it on a presentation given for ART 2 years ago it turned out that a lot more was expected. It described how we would plan our sessions on our return to ringing after COVID and the hurdles that village bands might face. It then was followed by some ideas for recruitment and retention which have worked well for our band. 140 people were booked on the course with 114 attending and several contacts made afterwards which Debbie continues to support. It was deemed to be a useful presentation with people taking away a few ideas for their bands.



Lockdown Learners at Lytchett Matravers

We have 3 new Lockdown Learners who joined us during the year in Ringing Room. They have come on in leaps and bounds with the theory of Plain Hunt, Mexican Wave, Dodging and much more. They have benefitted from Zoom training on how a bell works and the parts of a bell using Share Screen or by watching videos of ringing. We were delighted eventually to welcome two of them into St Mary's to see the bells and have a go at chiming and doing the hand ring exercise - basically anything they could do with good social distancing. We then had to vacate our church as we are having new electrics and other exciting things put in during June but we did manage to have another session at neighbouring Lytchett Minster. The bells here were easier to access for one of our ringers so two of them have already got lots of ticks in their ART logbook and done a bit more than pressing a key on a keyboard.



Our third Lockdown learner is Debbie's sister from North Yorkshire, and would you believe it that her planned visit, once we were allowed to travel, was the day the scaffolding went up. However, Lytchett Minster to the rescue and they kindly let us visit for Judy to see the bells and have a pull on a rope which she thoroughly enjoyed. At least the seed has now been sown and who knows what might follow.

Well, that was the plan anyway! At the school demonstration, our vicar Stephen swung an historic clapper backwards and

forwards with ease so I thought Viv could manage that too. However, the clapper we brought out of the church was a more modern one with extra bits attached and it was too cumbersome! Instead Viv and I went to church the day before to get the other slightly smaller one. When we got it down we decided it was rather heavy and not suitable – Health and Safety considered. Viv decided to improvise with my brolly. Most of the WI know Viv who has lived in the village for most of her life, so when I turned to Viv and said "and Viv is going to demonstrate the clapper.....Viv you have been

ringing in our tower for as many years as the rest of us put together,

know the difference between a clapper and an umbrella!" it was met with great laughter.

I talked a little bit about the history of the tower and the weights of the bells and what we did when the bells were out of the tower in 2019 during the restoration process and then LOCKDOWN. I explained how we used Ringing Room and were only able to ring one bell when we got back into the tower and how we also had some handbell sessions. This made me think about a bit of audience participation to explain how bellringing is a mental

activity as well as a physical one. I wasn't sure how long it would take to persuade 3 WI members to come and join in, but no sooner had I asked they were there! A brief explanation on how to ring a hand and backstroke on a handbell and then to avoid them getting very bored just following the previous bell, so I called them into Queens. Well, there was great laughter and lots of cameras came out to take photos.

All in all, a very different presentation to the others I have given but much improved with it being the interactive session. How I fitted that into half an hour I'm not guite sure.

Lytchett 'Ring Out The Old' at Cranborne

31st December 2021

On a wet and gloomy New Years' Eve, thirteen Lytchett ringers from both towers assembled at the large medieval church of St Mary and St Bartholomew at Cranborne, accompanied by Jane and Nigel Pridmore from the Dorchester Branch and our Branch Ringing Master, Jack Pease.

As is tradition, the bells were half muffled to ring out the old year; especially poignant on this occasion because of the number of deaths from coronavirus throughout 2021. The bells were rung up by two local ringers and Gordon then helped to muffle them.



The tower at Cranborne is both lofty and spacious, built in 1440 at the expense of Richard, Duke of York when Cranborne was a monastery of considerable wealth; being easily able to seat 20 people in the ringing chamber; a far cry from the cozy ringing chambers at our own towers!

Ringing began shortly after 10am, and included various goes at rounds to begin with. Cranborne bells are not by the standards difficult to ring but they are much bigger and slower than our bells! Several ringers rang their heaviest bells, including Sarah and Cathy on the 7th and tenor bells respectively.

There is also the added challenge at Cranborne (compared to our own bells) of an unguided drop, which required us to practice our straight pulls! Everyone did well however, and by the end of the first hour, everyone was much more relaxed and confident. For two ringers, Sue and Jennie, it was also their first ring on more than six bells and both did well at adapting to the slower speed of eight bells.

A short break was held at the halfway point where we had some delicious festive-flavoured brownies courtesy of the Ringing Master, biscuits made by Debbie and chocolates brought by Sue. Ringing resumed with some touches of Plain Bob and Grandsire Doubles for our more experienced ringers. Debbie called a touch of Bob Doubles without aid for the first time. Sarah and Viv trebled to these methods superbly despite a recent lack of practice.

We also rang a variant of "Whole pull and stand", whereby this is done repeatedly except for the tenor, which carries on. This was particularly effective on these heavier half muffled bells. This was a great success, as all ringers present stood their bell every single time, no dropped handstrokes! This included some of our less experienced ringers such as Helen, who despite being on heavier and unknown bells, managed it flawlessly.

To finish off with, a touch of Plain Bob Doubles was rung on the 'minor' six, achieved by using bells 2-7. Rather than being in a traditional major scale, ringing bells 2-7 puts the bells into what is known as a "Dorian" scale, and it is particularly somber when half muffled; a fitting end to a difficult and at times upsetting year for many.
