## Silencing The Bells

January $10^{\text {th }} 2022$

The sound of the village church bells are loved by many in the village especially as they were silent for so long during COVID lockdowns. However, we know that for those in close proximity to us they need to be silenced during some of our learner or even more advanced ringing practices. Cathy Neyland has been instigating the ability to simply stop the clapper from hitting the side of the bell and making a noise for our novices but also by using a simulator we are able to hear the reproduced sound of the bells through a computer for more advanced learning. A few of our ringers are able to go into the bell chamber and help Cathy tie the bells and we wanted to share the comments from our Church Warden and bellringer Ann Manning who helped last week. Debbie Phipps (Tower Captain)
"When Cathy suggested I might like to help her silence 2 of the bells in our tower I jumped at the opportunity, if I'm honest I didn't give it that much thought. I
remembered as a child watching my dad dodge about the bell tower at our local church in London, somehow thought no worries I can do that. All was not quite what I had in my head when I clambered up into the bell chamber, Cathy was like a young elf bobbing around the bells, I was still struggling to work out how to get across the hatch and at the same time
 forgetting my right foot from my left foot, when Cathy shouted instructions, don't hang on to the wheel don't stand on the sensors and hold on!!!! By this time Debbie joined us, yet another nimble elf amongst the bells and on top of all this wanted a photo and a smile!!! Well eventually between Debbie \& Cathy I managed to get down with the bells, wow, I felt quite a sense of achievement. Cathy then explained how we were going to silence the bells, had no idea so I was so impressed with Cathy's invention of ropes, rubber inner tubes and above all knowing what knots to use to attach to the clapper to silence them. Am not going to try and explain exactly how it all worked but worked it did. Maybe Cathy might let you all in on her invention??? I was so pleased with myself to see how it was all done and actually forgot all about trying to get back down, which proved much easier, perhaps I knew if I'd got up there I would be able to get back down somehow.

I hope I haven't put anyone off, take it from me it was a bit scary at first but so good to get up there and experience being next to the bells. I will be doing this again and I hope sometime to be able to nip around just like Debbie \& Cathy." Ann Manning (Bell Silencer in training!)

## Resources for a Dorset village band

What is the first question in the ART Ringers Personal Progress Logbook? "What is your Learning Style?" And with a band of sixteen novice ringers in our Dorset village, who have all learnt through the ART schemes, this is so important to remember, and needless to say, we have a great mixture of all types.
When two of us from our tower attended the ART Module 1 day course in 2016 we felt we could share the job, with Annie teaching the bell handling, whilst I would produce the handouts for moving on. Having written many manuals on how to use the different Microsoft Office programs I thought I could manage this task but first of all I had to learn how Plain Hunt worked and not just which bell I had to follow when ringing bell 2 !
Searching online for extra resources back then might just have brought up the Fortran resources but now ringingteachers.org is high on the list, and once you start delving into this huge bank of resources you won't need to search any further. Over the six years of researching and providing theory for my ringers, more resources have been put on the ART website (www.ringingteachers.org). These ART resources are clear, understandable and consistent. However, not all learning styles are satisfied by reading information so we also use their quizzes and games. And there's more - I'm sure many teachers have demonstrated by 'Walking though Plain Hunt' in person along a line (row) and if not, there's an explanation on the ART website. I've also explored new ways of explaining things - one of the challenges in the 'In My Tower' section of 50 Ringing Things encouraged me to produce short videos to explain methods such as Plain Hunt and Plain Bob Doubles.
A few years ago, finding the resources on the website was tricky but they are now clearly labelled in the Teaching Toolbox section. There are resources for all skills from Foundation to Stedman Doubles! For other learning styles I refer my ringers to the excellent ART YouTube channel (www.youtube.com/ringingteachers).
Useful training aids and ideas can also be found on the Ringing Teachers and the 50 Ringing Things Facebook groups. Only recently someone put up an excellent Plain Bob Doubles quiz. What a great team of ringing teachers ART has produced. Keep up the good work.
To sum up: Why invent the wheel - use the ART website, Facebook groups or YouTube channel. Look into 50 Ringing Things and see what you could do and share with others.

## Tower Spring Clean

## Monday $7^{\text {th }}$ March

Gordon's email about our Spring Clean - "The Boss" has asked me to organise stuff for Monday Spring Clean! ## Spring Outing to Mid Devon

Saturday 26th March 2022
On a glorious late March day, 12 members of the Salisbury Diocesan Guild and Guild of Devonshire Ringers met up at Uffculme in Mid Devon for a morning of ringing. However, the villagers are clearly very fond of their bells, because over our two hour visit, countless numbers of them came down to watch and express their delight.

Steph rang a touch of Stedman Doubles on the back six, something of a rarity these days in East Dorset, and Jennie rang both strokes together on eight bells for the first time, as well as her first ever go at called changes. Some of the comments from villagers included:
"It's been a long time since l've heard the bells, and with windows wide open in the sun, it was a true delight. At first, I thought it was a wedding, but it soon became clear that it was something more. Thank you so very much, it was beautifu!!"

## Ringing Master for 20mins March

## Lytchett Ringers visit Kingston

## Thursday 28th April 2022

On a slightly chilly April evening, thirteen members of the Matravers and Minster bands met in the glorious surroundings of Kingston for an evening on 6, 8 and 10 bells. Only the second time the bands have joined forces to ring on ten bells without significant outside help, the evening promised to be special.

The first hour of the evening began on the tuneful front six, where all were able to get the feel of these fine bells. Ringing in the first hour included several sets of called changes, Plain Hunt on 5 and touches of Plain Bob and Grandsire Doubles.

Ringing in the second hour focused on ringing the heavier back bells, renowned in Dorset and beyond for being of particularly fine tone. When it is remembered that the tenor at Matravers is just under 8cwt, and the tenor at Minster just under 10cwt, high levels of skill are needed to ring bells as large as Kingston, where the two largest bells are 20cwt and 27cwt respectively.

The second hour included rounds and called changes on the back six and back eight, Grandsire Doubles and Plain Hunt Minor. Everyone present enjoyed the chance to ring much larger bells than is normally possible and many showed themselves to be skilled enough to do Kingston justice.
go up to the belfry with ear defenders and watch these large bells swing mere feets away.
Ringing concluded with a game devised by the Ringing Master. All grabbed hold of their chosen bell, and were told to ring one whole pull and stand. Those who did not stand were out of the game, and the remaining ringers would move round to fill the gaps left by those who were eliminated. In the end, only three ringers were left - Debbie from Matravers became the only woman standing, Jon from Minster and the Ringing Master, Jack. Debbie and Jon ended up in a draw for second place when neither successfully stood, which left the Ringing Master victorious, and many eager for a second go!

Many notable firsts were scored during the evening, including:

- Sue's longest ring yet, comprising nearly 10 minutes of called changes
- Debbie's first blows conducting Grandsire on tower bells
- Heaviest bells for Sue, Jennie and Viv (14cwt); Maureen and Mark (20cwt) and Cathy, who rang the tenor (27cwt) for the first time, shattering her previous record by half a tonne!


## Ringing Master for 20 minutes continues

Friday 29 ${ }^{\text {th }}$ April 2022
I was bowled over when the next person piped up to
 say she wanted to have a go as she was one of our latest recruits and was still learning the basics but has been really interested in all the ART exercises we use.
Jennie Pease was all set to run the April session.
This is what Jennie had to say:
"I joined the band at St. Mary's Church, Lytchett Matravers at the end of 2021 as a novice. Early in 2022, Debbie Phipps, Tower Captain, gave us all a challenge. On the last Friday of the month, each of us would take a turn to lead a 20 minute 'Trainer' session, to perhaps work on a skill we wished to improve/develop, or something the band needed to practice. Despite being a novice, I volunteered fairly early on purely on the basis that if I managed to come up with an idea, I didn't want someone else to run with the same, leaving me back at square one! My initial idea was changed at the last minute after attending a session at Kingston, run by Ringing Master Jack Pease. He had devised a game whereby people chose a bell, and the instruction was for one whole pull before standing. Anyone who failed to stand was out and the remaining ringers moved round to fill the gaps. This was both hugely enjoyable and a useful skill to practice, so after a consultation with Debbie, I ran my session with this game, which I called 'Last bell standing'.

Running a practice is not as easy as Debbie makes it look, so I was grateful for the support and input from Jack. However, I think everyone enjoyed playing, and over the two rounds, Viv and Gordon were the winners. Sarah narrowly missed out to Gordon in a long bout between the two. Playing this game definitely makes you think about making sure your technique is spot on in order to stand the bell and I hope the experienced ringers found it as useful as this novice. It might be interesting at a later date to play it again, but add in a variation of standing at backstroke." Jennie Pease

Jennie made an expert job of organising the band and came up with a good little game. Even though it was the least experienced who dropped out first it only lasted a short time and gave a real challenge to the two left at the end and everyone enjoyed cheering them both on. Well done Jennie.

## Ringing Master for 20 mins May <br> $6^{\text {th }}$ May - Viv Endecott

All of our ringers have a 'job' in the band and Viv's is to support those doing 50 Ringing Things. When she said she wanted to get some of them together during one of our practices to talk through how they were getting on I suggested she did it for the whole of the band so we could all experience from her suggestions.

So Viv Endecott took on the May challenge. This is what Viv had to say:

"When our Tower Captain wanted us to experience running a practice, she didn't need to delegate as we were all so keen; each of us was to lead a 20 minute session on some aspect of ringing.

When my turn came, I decided to enthuse the band about the 50 Ringing Things scheme. I had returned to ringing after a thirty year break and used the challenges it offered to invite myself to other towers, make a bell from Meccano and eat a lot of cake.

Success! Our newest recruit liked the sound of all that (particularly the cake bit) and has already gained her Bronze certificate.

I now encourage all our new recruits to look at 50 Ringing Things because it introduces them to the wider ringing world, makes them useful members of their tower and branch and also helps us to get to know our new members better."

This was our first outing including ringing since Lockdown so it was a very special day. We also had 3 new ringers who hadn't rung on Brownsea before. The day started by meeting up to get the ferry and then when we arrived on Brownsea Cathy gave us one of her very interesting tours. We were fortunate enough to see a red squirrel which even ran across the path in front of some of us. We stopped in the church on the way and were joined by Janet who plays the organ. She played a couple of hymns on the Foot pumped

## Debbie conquers Plain Bob Minor!

April 7th, May 2nd, May 12th, June 16th

For quite some time now, Debbie has had an ambition, a goal, to pass Level 5 of ART's Learning the Ropes Scheme. Level 5 is a big jump up from Level 4, involving ringing quite a bit of Minor. Minor involves ringing all six bells to a method, whereas in Doubles, it covers behind. This leads to a completely different feel and sound, and though it is only one extra bell compared to Doubles, it is substantially more difficult. ART Level 5 requires the ringer to ring a quarter of a Minor method inside before it can be ticked off, so Debbie planned to do just that.

Debbie and Cathy invited Angie Jasper, Jane and Nigel Pridmore, Robin Mears, Robert Newton, Paul Tyson, Alan Bentley and myself to a practice one Thursday morning in April at Lytchett Matravers to see if we could help. A very useful morning, with Debbie ringing plain courses inside and Cathy trebling.

It was apparent though, in conversations between Debbie and I afterwards, that though the Lytchett Matravers bells are easy to ring, they are hung in an odd layout, with the ropes in three straight lines, making ropesight difficult. They are also fairly small bells, which makes them turn quickly, shortening the amount of thinking time available.

I offered to organise a further session on some heavier bells, which hopefully would make it a little easier, this offer was accepted and a further session was duly held at Spetisbury on Monday 2nd May. This was much more successful, with Cathy trebling to touches and Debbie ringing touches inside. However, like Lytchett, the bells at Spetisbury have the ropes in three straight lines, and as further work was needed on the singles, I offered to organise a third and final session for practice.

The third practice was held at Shillingstone on May 12th, a combined morning focusing on Plain Bob Minor for Debbie and Grandsire Doubles for Cathy. Shillingstone have an excellent rope circle, but with heavy bells and a long draft, they take a fair bit of ringing. Nevertheless, some very good ringing was achieved, with the calls sorted out in both methods. Now for the quarter!

After a few unsuccessful attempts at organising a quarter peal before the Platinum Jubilee, a date was duly fixed for June. I was again asked to organise this, booking the bells at Martinstown near Dorchester for the attempt. These are a similar weight ring of six to Lytchett Matravers, but now Debbie had the calls and the rhythm sorted, the faster speed was no longer an issue. Martinstown are a delightful set
 of bells, very musical and easy to ring so an ideal venue for a quarter.

On a blisteringly hot Thursday 16th June, Debbie, myself and four other ringers assembled at Martinstown for the attempt. A quarter was duly scored in 45 minutes, meaning Debbie can finally sign off Level 5. Well done Debbie! Jack Pease

## End of Year Tower Check

December 7th
As part of the end of year tower check we decided to replace a number of the stay nuts which had begun to work loose due to vibration. Nuts on bells 2 to 6 were replaced with locknuts which will not be affected by vibration. Treble bell is unaffected. Note that should these nuts have to be removed (broken stay) the locknuts should be discarded as they are single use. Spares are in the box in mid chamber.
